The Trust celebrates 20 years

The Clan Maclean Heritage Trust was established as a charity in 1996 by the Clan Maclean Association to recognise and cherish the heritage of Clan Maclean around the world, as well as in Scotland, and to educate a wider public about it. Its Trustees include ex-officio, the Chief and the President of the Association, along with others nominated by the Chief and the Association.

The Association, in its early days, had attempted this task, including erecting a tombstone at Soroby, Tiree, to the Maclean bard, and publishing historical pamphlets on clan history, including a History of the Rankins.

In 1986, the Association placed an armorial stone

above the entrance to Duart Castle, and in 1992 they restored the ancient Maclean burial ground at Lochaline. But, by 1993, it had become clear that the Fund needed to take a different approach.

The Drimnin cairn to commemorate Charles Maclean, who was killed leading the Macleans at Flodden, was erected in 1996 (See page 2), the year in which the Trust took over from the Clan Maclean Heritage Fund.

For the following five years, it was led by Major Nicholas Maclean Bristol of Breacachadh Castle.

It contributed to the memorial cairn at Ticonderoga, USA, to the Hector Maclean cairn in Killean, Australia and built a cairn at Triagh Ghruinneart on Islay.

Many more projects have followed, and we pay tribute to those in the Association who worked so hard in those early years to make the Trust what it is today - an organisation that carries out the Trust's aims and objectives around the world, chaired by The Chief.

Cairn Park, Antigonish

Cairn Park, in Antigonish, Nova Scotia, is home to a collection of cairns erected by Scottish clans.

Clan Maclean Atlantic constructed a cairn at Cairn Park, in Antigonish, which was unveiled by Sir Lachlan Maclean in 2009. Construction of the cairn included stones contributed by members of Clan Maclean Atlantic, taken from areas important to local Macleans.

The cairn was dedicated to the Maclean pioneers who settled the Atlantic provinces.

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Percy Guthrie and the Maclean Kilties

On 17th September 2016, a celebration of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the 236th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, popularly known as the MacLean Kilties, was held at Canadian Forces Base Gagetown, New Brunswick.

The highlight of the celebration was the launch of Dr. Paul Belliveau's book *Percy Guthrie and the Maclean Kilties*.

Among the 116 people in attendance were the Hon. Lisa Harris, Minister responsible for Celtic Affairs in the New Brunswick Government; Lt. Col Erik Andresen, CFB Gagetown; Andrea MacLean-Holohan, Clan MacLean Atlantic; Ian MacLean, CMHT, and Mel Fitton, New Brunswick Scottish-Cultural Association.

Piping on Mull and Iona

William MacLean was born in 1878 at Tobermory, Mull, from a Raasay family. He was related to the famous MacKay piping family of that island.

He was taught by his father and Malcolm Macpherson, 'Calum Piobair'. He joined the Cameron Highlanders in 1914 and was pipe major of the 5th Battalion.

He won the Inverness Gold medal in 1901 (Lament for Donald Duaghal MacKay), and the Oban in 1912 (MacCrimmon's Sweetheart) and the Clasp in 1913 (Unjust Incarceration).

When aged 77 he made a number of recordings for the School of Scottish Studies, Edinburgh University, which provide an important link with piping in the 19th century. He composed a number of tunes among which were Raasay Highlanders, Lachlan MacLean, Duart Castle, Battle of Arras and a piobaireachd, Salute to the Children. MacLean died at Kilcreggan in 1957.

In November 2016, the trust made a grant of £500 to the Mull and Iona

Schools Pipers as part of our programme of promoting and advancing the education of the public in the history, music and traditions of Clan Maclean.

The Battle of Port a' Bheathain

The beaches of Mull have resounded for centuries to the crunch of raiding birlinns or galleys coming to shore.

Donald Morrison and Archie Maclean, two noted Mull seanchaidhean or tradition-bearers, told the story in fine Mull Gaelic, of an engagement between the MacPhies of Colonsay who came cattle-reiving to the Ross of Mull, and the Macleans at whose hands they met their fate.

Port Bheathain on the Isle of Mull The battle was the result of a vendetta arising from the murder of a much-favoured Maclean henchman, a MacGillvray in Glen Cannel, by a mysterious Colonsay man. The man appeared in Mull and enquired where MacGillvray was. When told he was hunting in Gleann Mòr, the man asked 'How will I recognise him?', and received the reply that he would be hunting with a hound which had a white ear.

The man murdered MacGillvray and left his corpse in the Glen but, during his return journey to Colonsay, he stopped at Penny-

ghael and set fire to a house belonging to MacGillvray's brother.

On his way to the sea, he met a man who was afoot early and, pointing to the burning house, told him to tell the owner that there was a dead dog in Glenmore which he should bury. The murder enraged Maclean of Duart who sent a message to Colonsay asking that the man be returned so that local justice might be done. It is uncertain what happened next.

The MacPhies either dumped the body of the messenger on shore in the Ross of Mull with a willow withy through his two eyes, or possibly executed the Colonsay man in this manner and dumped his body, without trial, on the shores of the Ross.

Whatever happened, the tale recounts that, as a result of this insult, a company of people called 'The Rugged Banner of the Ross of Mull and the

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Black Men of Bròlas' (Garbh Bhratach an Rois agus Fir Dhubha Bhròlais) allied themselves to a party of the Macleans of Torloisk who, on receiving news of the incursion(I), arrived on horseback.

Under the able tactical skill of an Eòlachan (a skilled guide who knew the lie of the land) whom Donald Morrison identified as Lachainn Odhar,(2) the Macleans received their orders. He briefed them that there was an ebbing tide and that the Colonsay birlinns would soon be beached.

The shore would be the killing-ground. Under his direction, the Macleans made a tactical withdrawal to the hills until, pursued by the Colbhasaich (Men of Colonsay) they reached near the site of an ancient religious settlement, Cill a Ghuibean. The Eòlachan had chosen a piece of dead ground where a stop-group of Macleans were placed in an ambush, concealed in the heather between the invaders and their galleys.

The ambush was to be sprung when the group saw the Eolachan's bald head leading the Macleans counter-attack downhill.

On the command of the Eòlachan, the stop-group ambushed the MacPhies. They broke through the ambush, only to find their boats high and dry. Lachlann Mòr MacLean, a great archer, was among the clansmen He could slice the head off bog-cotton with an arrow from his bow.

With men like him in the company, considerable slaughter of the MacPhies took place at what came to be known as Blar Port Bheathain(3).

It is said that nine-times-nine bailerfuls of MacPhie fingers and thumbs were gathered after the battle: a folklore motif which occurs fairly frequently in tales of Highland fights involving sea-going vessels.

There may have been a good number of MacPhie survivors but they would find it hard to row home to Colonsay, grasping an oar with three fingers!

Donald Morrison's Gaelic account of the tale, as recorded, is ambiguous at this point. He says: 'Thruis garbh-bhratach a'Rois's Fir Dhubha Bhròlais's Cloinn Illeathain Thorrloisgte. This could be interpreted as 'The Fierce Banner of the Ross gathered both the Black Men of Brolas and the Macleans of Torloisk'. In other words, a form of fiery cross or gathering banner was employed.
