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Note

For the purpose of putting names into alphabetical order, no distinction has been made between different spellings of Maclean. In other words, for any Maclean, however spelled, the determining factor is the first name. This is intended to make it easier to find a particular Maclean for readers who may not be sure how the surname is spelled. Also, subjects with only one forename come before subjects with two or more forenames or with one forename and then one or more initials. Thus, John Maclean (or McLean) comes before John Angus Maclean or John A. Maclean. Military ranks and titles are ignored for this purpose. Where two or more subjects have the same first name and no other forenames or initials, as is the case with John Maclean, they are listed in chronological order by date of birth.

When reading this document in electronic form, you can go directly to a particular section by placing your cursor on the applicable text above and then pressing Ctrl + Enter (in Microsoft Office 2007; other applications may differ). The same actions will take you directly from any name in either the country index or the alphabetical index to that name in the main section. The sources indicated in each entry can be accessed in the same way. **[This facility is not yet fully enabled.]**

INTRODUCTION

The mission of the Clan Maclean Heritage Trust is "promoting and advancing the education of the public in the history, traditions and music of the Clan Maclean" (from the 1996 Trust Deed). In particular, it seeks to preserve and make widely known the great contribution that members of the Clan Maclean have made, and are still making, in politics, medicine, literature, music, sport, exploration and other forms of scientific endeavour, military campaigns and many other fields. This register of eminent Macleans and others of historical interest is designed to assist in fulfilling this objective.

The main part of the register provides a summary of the life and achievements of individual Macleans categorised by sector. This is followed by an index of the same Macleans identified by the country in which they lived for the important part of their lives, which is not necessarily the land of their birth, and then a full alphabetical index. For this purpose all Macleans, however spelled, are listed in the alphabetical order of their first name, in order to save people from having to look in several different parts of the index when they do not know how a particular Maclean surname is spelled (see Note on previous page).

This register is intended to be only an introduction to the Macleans that have been included. Given the limited resources of the Trust, it was not practical to undertake the extensive research that would have been required in order to produce a definitive and comprehensive biography of each person. In many cases, too, such an approach would have simply duplicated research that has already been undertaken by others. The object of this register therefore is to draw attention and, we hope, spark interest in Macleans whose achievements are perhaps not widely enough known and to demonstrate the breadth and variety of the fields to which Macleans have contributed. We hope that the readers of this register will be inspired to undertake their own research into the Macleans in which they are particularly interested. We have tried in this register to include possible sources of information for this purpose.

We must emphasise that, as the result of this approach, we have not attempted to verify the accuracy of the sources that we have used. In particular, information in Wikipedia must be treated with extreme caution. We are aware of numerous errors in Wikipedia articles about Macleans. Where we find them, we endeavour to correct the Wikipedia article concerned. There are, however, certain to be many other errors. Also, Wikipedia entries may be corrected and updated by others. The information in this register may not reflect the latest version of such entries. In some of the older sources, too, the compilers have occasionally changed the biographical material in order to fit this to their own preconceived notions. We cannot guarantee the accuracy of the information in this register.

Nevertheless, we do want this register to be as comprehensive and accurate as possible. We therefore encourage readers to correct any information that appears in this register or in any of our sources, to add to the existing entries and to suggest other Macleans who should be included. This does not need to be limited to people bearing the surname Maclean (however spelled). It can include people with Maclean mothers or grandparents or, in the case of married women, Maclean maiden names. See Appendix III for a list of the information that we ideally like to have. We hope that this register will demonstrate the enormous contributions that Macleans have made and will help all Macleans to take justifiable pride in the achievements of our Clan.

Rev. Alexander Maclean Sinclair LLD (1840-1924) Canada	Although Alexander Maclean Sinclair was a minister of the Presbyterian Church for 40 years, he is better known as a Gaelic scholar and family historian. He also wrote Gaelic poetry. His book on the Clan Maclean was his major achievement. He was born on 1 March 1840 at the home of his maternal grandfather, John MacLean, known as the Bard MacLean (see Arts and Crafts - Literature and History) in Glenbard, Antigonish County. His mother, Christy (1809-1887), had emigrated with her father from Tiree in 1819 at the age of nine. His father John Sinclair (1797-1876) had emigrated from Sutherland in 1832. In 1856 he entered the Pictou Academy, where he studied for about a half a year. He returned to the Academy for a further four months in 1858 while teaching at the same time. Subsequently, he studied at the Free Church College, Halifax and Dalhousie College, Halifax. He became an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church at the age of 26 in 1866 and spent 40 years in the ministry, serving congregations in Springville and Sunnybrae for 22 years and then in Belfast, Prince Edward Island, for 18 years. He retired from the active ministry in 1906 and eventually settled in Hopewell, N.S. where he built a house. He had a life-long interest in the Gaelic language, and while in Springville in 1874, he developed a strong interest in local and family history. He published about 15 volumes of Gaelic poetry between 1880 and 1904, as well as numerous articles for periodicals. After retirement from the ministry, he taught Celtic Studies at Dalhousie University and at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, Nova Scotia, for 7 years. He was made a fellow of the Gaelic Society of Canada and in 1914 was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws by Dalhousie University. He married Mary Ann Campbell in 1882 and the couple had four sons and one daughter: Charles (born 1885), John (1888), Christy (1891), George (1895) and Donald (1899). He died at Hopewell on 14 February 1924 and is buried in Glenbard Cemetery, next to the grave of his grandfather, the Bard MacLean. In May 2009 a symposium on the influences and legacy of Alexander Maclean Sinclair was held at St Francis Xavier University, co-sponsored by the Clan Maclean Heritage Trust with the Celtic Studies Department of the University and Clan Maclean Atlantic

Professor David A. McLean		David McLean became Professor of History at King's College, London, in 1999. He came to King's in 1978 having previously been a Draper's Research Fellow at Pembroke College, Cambridge since 1973. He was visiting Professor at Hiroshima Shudo University in 2002 and at Nihon University, Tokyo in 1985. Professor McLean's research interests span four broad areas of historical enquiry. Most recently his research has focussed on public health and local government, with particular reference to cholera epidemics, in nineteenth century Britain and the development of military medicine. The second area of his work has been in educational development in nineteenth century British schools, particularly the introduction of new educational ideas in the mid-nineteenth century and the tensions which change caused in established institutions. The third area was diplomatic history, publishing the results of research on the Anglo-French entente of the 1840s and the long political career of Lord Palmerston. Prof McLean has also written widely on economic history where he focussed on the role of British banks and overseas commerce in the developing relationship between Britain and other parts of the global economy, specifically Latin America, China, Persia and Turkey.

She attended the BIA Day School in Barrow until 1957; then went away for her 8th grade year to the Wrangell Institute, in Wrangell, Alaska; then progressed on to attend Mt. Edgecumbe High School, in Sitka, Alaska. After graduation from high school, she attended the University of Alaska Fairbanks for two years then headed to Colorado Women's College in Denver where she received her BA degree; then she moved to California where she received her teaching credentials from the University of California Berkeley. Later she received an MA in bilingual education from the University of Washington, and finally a doctorate in education from Stanford University. She has been the President of Ilisagvik College in her hometown of Barrow, Alaska since 1995. Fluent and literate in her Native language, Iñupiaq-Eskimo, North Slope Alaskan dialect, Dr. MacLean has published extensive reference materials for Iñupiaq language and culture including language curriculum and an abridged Iñupiaq and English Dictionary. Edna MacLean has devoted many years of distinguished service to the field of education. Named Educator of the Year 2000 by the Alaska Native Education Council, she was also twice recognized as Alaska Native Educator of the Year by the Alaska Federation of Natives in 1989 and 1996. She served for several years as the Special Assistant for Rural and Alaska Native Education to the State of Alaska Commissioner of Education. Dr. MacLean was appointed to the National Science Foundation Polar Programs Office Advisory Committee, 1996-1999 and elected as a Fellow of the Arctic Institute of North America in recognition of her significant contributions to the knowledge of the polar and sub-polar regions, 1985. She has been recognized by the Barrow City Council and the Ukpeabvik Iñupiaq Corporation for her many contributions to education. She is also a founding member and chairperson of the Consortium for Alaska Native Higher Education and a member of the steering committee for the International Cross-Cultural Education Seminar Series in the Circumpolar North. In 2003, she was inducted into Stanford University's Multicultural and Native American Alumni Hall of Fame as well as Women of the Village Grassroots Hall of Fame. Professor Gerald MacLean UK	 Gerald MacLean is currently Professor of English Literature at the University of Exeter (UK), founder and co-director of Exeter Turkish Studies. He is a Fellow of the Royal Asiatic Society and of the Royal Historical Society of London. Born in Ontario, he studied at Jesus College, Cambridge and then wrote a MPhil thesis on Blake's Vala manuscript at the University of Waterloo before spending some years teaching in Greece and Libya. He wrote a doctoral dissertation on the vernacular backgrounds to Dryden's political poetry at the University of Virginia, and taught briefly at Queen's University, Kingston, the University of Southern California, and Cornell before settling in Detroit as Professor of English at Wayne State University (1983-2006). He has published widely on the literature and cultural history of the seventeenth century in England, focusing on the politics of poetic form, print culture, and the editing of seventeenth-century texts. He has lectured and conducted research in Algeria, Canada, Greece, Libya, Romania, Syria, Tunisia, Turkey and the USA, and has been visiting professor at Boğazici University, Istanbul, and the Institute for Arab and Islamic Studies at Exeter University. He is a founding member of The Evliya Çelebi Way Project, an international group of scholars and equestrians who travelled across western Anatolia on horseback in the autumn of 2009 following the route of the great Ottoman travel writer and historian. A second ride, from Gaziantep to Aleppo and back to Sanliurfa, is being planned for 2011, the 400th anniversary of Evliya's birth. During World War II he was a wireless operator for the RAF Transport Command.

In 1946 he joined the Montreal Standard as assistant editor, becoming its music critic the following year. In 1949 he succeeded H.P. Bell as music critic of the Montreal Daily Star and served in that position until the Star closed in 1979. In November of that year he became music critic of the Montreal Gazette, retiring in 1988 with the title of 'critic emeritus.' One of the first advocates of the preservation of historic Montreal McLean became a member, and later president, of the Jacques Viger Commission in 1962 and wrote *The Living Past of Montreal* (Montreal 1964; 3rd rev ed 1993). He was a member 1957-75 and later to 1998, and vice-president 1975-7, of the Arts Council of Greater Montreal, president 1965-6 of the Music Critics' Association of America, and served

	on the Canada Council 1970-7. Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts (England), McLean was also awarded the Canadian Music Council Medal in 1973 and was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada in 1975. In 1993 La Société historique de Montréal awarded him its medal. His translation of Jean Palardy's <i>Meubles anciens du Canada français</i> was published in 1963 as <i>The Early Furniture of French Canada</i>. He contributed articles to several music and art publications (Opera Canada, including the 1990-95 series "Great Canadian musical figures of the past"; the Canada Music Book, the Canadian Music Journal, The New Grove Dictionary, and EMC) and broadcast often for CBC radio as a critic or commentator. He died on 26 January 1848 in Addington Forks, Nova Scotia, and is buried at Glenbard Cemetery. His tombstone was engraved with words in Gaelic. An English translation of these words is provided on an adjacent bronze plaque which was unveiled on 16 October 2010, sponsored by the Clan Maclean Heritage Trust and Clan Maclean Atlantic Canada.

She moved to Canada after marrying Allan Maclean of Ingersoll, Ontario. They moved to Kingston, Ontario, when Allan became an officer of the Hospital for the Insane there. Loyal to her adopted country, Kate Seymour Maclean became a strong advocate of the Canada First movement (see below). She died in Toronto in 1913 or 1914 at the age of 86. She published her poetry in literary magazines such as Canadian Monthly and National Review, Queen's College Journal and The Week. Three collections of her poems were published as books: – The Coming of the Princess; and Other Poems (Hunter, Rose & Company, Toronto, 1881) – Advent days and poems of remembrance (Jackson Press, Kingston, Ontario, 1902) – From the balcony and other poems (Jackson Press, Kingston, Ontario, 1904) The first of these can be read online from the Internet Archive (see link below). The other two are held by Library and Archives Canada in Ottawa. The Coming of the Princess contains an Introduction by Graeme Mercer Adam, the editor of Canadian Monthly, who speaks highly of her. A more nuanced appraisal, running the gamut from great to hopeless, is included in <i>Life and Times of the Right Honourable Sir John A. Macdonald: Premier of the Dominion of Canada</i> by Joseph Edmund Collins, pp 483 and 485-486 (Rose Publishing Company, Toronto, Canada, 1883). In <i>Songs of the Great Dominion: Voices from the Forests and Waters, the Settlements and Cities of Canada</i> by William Douw Lighthall, p xxxiii (Walter Scott, London, 1889), which is a key early anthology, she is described as "mistress of a style of singular richness", although none of her poems are actually included in the anthology, nor is she included among the "Notes Biographical and Bibliographical" at the end of the book. Two of her poems are however included in <i>A Treasury of Canadian Verse, with Brief Biographical Notes</i> by Theodore H Rand, pp 208-210 and 397 (E P Dutton & Co, New York, 1900). Kate Seymour Maclean was a well-known and highly regarded poet in her day but has since been largely overlooked. She does not appear in recent anthologies such as the New Oxford Book of Canadian Verse in English, selected by Margaret Atwood (Oxford University Press, 1985). Early Canadian writers are however now being re-assessed and it will be interesting to see how she is judged by posterity.

UK	Nicholas Maclean-Bristol spent the first part of his working life in the British Army, having joined the King's Own Scottish Borderers in 1955. After serving in Malaya, Germany, Aden, Yemen and Borneo, as well as the United Kingdom, he retired from the Army in 1972 [??]. In 1961 [??] he bought and began restoring Breacachadh Castle on Coll, the ancient seat of the Maclean of Coll chieftains, which had been sold by Hugh Maclean of Coll to John Lorne Stewart of Campbeltown in 1856 after four centuries of Maclean ownership. The castle had been built in the first half of the 15th century and had been unoccupied since 1750 [??]. The restoration was completed in 1993. In 1967 he founded what is now Britain's oldest Gap Year charity, the Project Trust, which sends 17-19 year old school-leavers overseas for 8 or 12 month volunteer placements in Africa, Asia and the Americas, where they engage in teaching, environmental and social care projects and Outward Bound courses. It currently sends about 250 volunteers to 23 countries annually. Since its formation it has sent 6,000 volunteers overseas and is widely respected as one of the most experienced and professional gap year organisations in Britain. Project Trust is also the main employer and revenue-earner on Coll. For this work Nicholas Maclean-Bristol was awarded the OBE in 1994. In 1972 he co-founded, with _____, The Society of West Highland and Island Historical Research (SWHIHR). The Society encourages research into the history of the West Highlands of Scotland and publishes the results in West Highland Notes and Queries, which appears at least annually and usually twice a year. He has written numerous articles and books on Hebridean history, including three books on the Clan Maclean: – <i>Warriors and Priests: The Clan Maclean 1300-1570</i> (Tuckwell Press, 1995) – <i>Murder Under Trust: the crimes and death of Sir Lachlan Mor Maclean of Duart, 1558-1598</i> (Tuckwell Press, 1999) – <i>From Clan to Regiment: 600 years in the Hebrides 1400-2000</i> (Pen and Sword Books, 2007)

Neil MacLean (1878-1962) UK	Gaelic singer Born 29 October 1878, son of John MacLean and Ann MacAskill of Ruisgarry, Isle of Skye Neil MacLean was one of the foremost Gaelic and Scots singers of the 20th century. A Mod Gold Medallist (in 1921), he made several recordings, all on 78 rpm records, and his voice was well known in many homes in the age of the gramophone. His first record, Bonnie Strathyre, was released in 1928 and he continued to make records, often accompanied by his wife Jenny Currie on piano, until the early 1950s. In 1929 he had a Royal Command Performance at Balmoral before King George V and Queen Mary - the only Gaelic

	singer of the 20th century to have this honour. His radio programme, <i>Sgeulachdan agus Oran</i> ('Stories and songs'), was the first regular programme when the BBC began broadcasting in Gaelic in 1923. Neil Maclean (Glasgow, 1895 [but see above] – 1962) Neil MacLean, born in Glasgow in 1895 (although he was brought up in Kilmore from an early age), was the most prolific Gaelic recording artist with over 120 Gaelic and Scots songs to his credit. His father came from the island of Coll and his mother from Tìrè, so ensuring a solid Gaelic upbringing. During the First World War he was a Lieutenant in charge of a minesweeper off the coast of Norway. He won the Mòd Gold Medal in Glasgow in 1921 and then, two years later, graduated from Glasgow University. In 1927 he married the pianist and soprano singer Jennie M. B. Currie with whom he made many gramophone records for the Parlophone Company. Their popularity as a husband and wife duo was only matched in later years by Calum Kennedy and wife Anne Kennedy (née Gillies). His recording, in English, of the song Bonnie Strathyre is reputed to have sold in excess of 100,000 copies. An unusual recording session took place in April 1932 when as Neil Maclean, MA., BSc. he recorded a series of records for the Gaelic Phono-Grammar label dedicated to learning the Gaelic language. These are incredibly rare. From 1924 until 1930 he was in charge of the BBC at Aberdeen, where on 2nd December 1924 the first Gaelic language broadcast was made. His daughter Catriona was later a BBC producer in Aberdeen He died in 1962. After the Dakotas were lured away to Billy J. Kramer by Brian Epstein, who was also the manager for the Beatles and for Gerry & the Pacemakers, Peter MacLaine formed another band called the Clan, which became one of the top bands in the north of England in the early 1960s. They too played at the Cavern. Their only single "Yes, I do/U.S. Mail" was released by Decca in 1963. Pete also performed with The Four Just Men.
Quentin Stuart Morvaren Maclean (1896-1962) UK	Organist Born in London on 14 May 1896, son of Alick Maclean (q.v.) Died in Toronto on 9 July 1962 Quentin Maclean was one of the most popular church and theatre organists of the mid-20th century, pursuing a dual career as a performer and recording artist that encompassed both popular and classical music, in addition to being a composer and teacher. He studied in England and on the continent, including time in Leipzig with Karl Straube and Max Reger, and was interned as an enemy alien with the outbreak of the First World War. Following his repatriation at the end of the war he served as an assistant organist at Westminster Cathedral under his former teacher, Sir Richard Terry. His introduction to popular audiences came when he embarked on a tour of British theatres with journalist/media star Lowell Thomas at the start of the '20s, during which he provided the musical accompaniment to Thomas' lecture and film presentation With Allenby in Palestine (recounting events most familiar to modern audiences from the movie Lawrence of Arabia). Maclean spent the years 1921-1939 playing the organ at various British movie palaces. From 1925 onward, he was also a fixture on the BBC, where his performances included a huge volume of light-classical pieces as well as the British premieres of both Paul Hindemith's and his own organ concertos. Long after the advent of talking pictures, which eliminated most live music from theatres, Maclean remained a star in the field, so popular was his playing; in those days, the biggest theatres provided organists to play as part of the entertainment between films, and he was among the best of them, playing to hundreds or even thousands of people at a time. He made numerous 78 rpm recordings in the '20s and '30s, for EMI's Columbia label, among other major imprints, including a version of "Rhapsody in Blue" adapted for his instrument, and pop standards such as "Body and Soul," "With a Song in My Heart," "Dancing with Tears in My Eyes," "Watching My Dreams Go By," "Miner's Dream of Home," "Just a Wee Deoch and Doris," and medleys such as "Parade of the Tin Soldiers"/"The Mosquitos Parade"/"My Love Parade." After a long residency at the Regal Cinema, Marble Arch, which featured what was then one of the largest theater organs in England, Maclean designed the Wurlitzer Cinema Pipe Organ - the largest instrument of its kind - for the new Gaumont State Theatre in Kilburn,

	the biggest movie palace in England. Maclean relocated to Canada in 1939, where he continued to play in movie theatres during the '40s, right to the end of the decade, even as he held academic and church posts, and broadcast extensively on the CBC, where he became popular for his contribution to children's programming. Pilot and photographer Alex MacLean has flown his plane over much of the United States documenting the landscape. Trained as an architect, he has portrayed the history and evolution of the land from vast agricultural patterns to city grids, recording changes brought about by human intervention and natural processes. MacLean's photographs have been exhibited widely in the United States, Canada, Europe and Asia and are found in private, public and university collections. He has won numerous awards, including the 2009 CORINE International Book Award, the American Academy of Rome's Prix de Rome in Landscape Architecture for 2003-2004, and grants from foundations such as the National Endowment for the Arts and Graham Foundation. MacLean is the author of seven books including *OVER: The American Landscape at the Tipping Point* (2008), *Visualizing Density* (2007), *The Playbook* (2006), *Designs on the Land: Exploring America from the Air* (2003), *Taking Measures Across the American Landscape* (1996), *Look at the Land; Aerial Reflections of America* (1993) and *Above and Beyond; Visualizing Change in Small Towns and Rural Areas* (2002). Graphic artist who was one of the pioneers who developed concert posters into an original and significant American art form.

Bonnie MacLean was born in Philadelphia, where she gained a BA degree in French from Pennsylvania State University. At the age of 21 she moved to New York City, landing a day job at the prestigious Pratt Institute and attending a figurative drawing class there in the evening. She moved to San Francisco in 1964 and began working as a secretary at Allis-Chalmers Equipment Manufacturing, where her boss was Bill Graham (1931-1991), then the company's office manager, whom she later married. He however soon turned to promoting local rock concerts at the Fillmore Auditorium, with MacLean joining him on the Fillmore staff to collect tickets, pass out handbills and count receipts.

In 1967 Graham fell out with Wes Wilson, the local artist responsible for creating the Fillmore's promotional posters, and asked MacLean to take over the task. Her design for The Doors and The Yardbirds was used to promote their appearance at the famous 1967 "Summer of Love" festival in Golden Gate Park. While her posters — for acts including the Jefferson Airplane, the Doors and Pink Floyd — followed in the psychedelic traditions established by Wilson, she also added her own distinctive touches, most notably her use of culturally-diverse images spanning from Native American totems to Nehru jackets. A recurring motif in her work is the use of faces, their expressions ranging from beatific serenity to hypnotic intensity.

MacLean's run as a Fillmore artist was brief, coming to a halt later in 1968 with the emergence of Lee Conklin, Rick Griffin and others. She parted from Bill Graham and returned to studying at the San Francisco Art Institute, the San Francisco Academy of Art and the California College of Arts and Crafts, Mexican extension. She subsequently turned to painting nudes and pastel landscapes while living in northern California with artist Jacques Fabert.

	In 1972 she returned to the East Coast and settled with Fabert in Buckingham, Pennsylvania. She divorced Graham in 1975. She has exhibited all over the USA and has permanent exhibitions at the Free Library of Philadelphia, Print and Pictures Department, and in the Hard Rock Cafe in Orlando, Florida. Examples of her work are held by The Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) in New York. Her work is currently displayed at the Riverbank Gallery in Stockton, New Jersey. Her posters are collectors' items. James Augustus McLean (1904-1989) USA	Painter of figures, portraits and landscapes Born in 1904 in Lincolnton, North Carolina, the son of a stonecutter. Studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts for five years from 1923. In 1926 he won the prestigious Cresson Travelling Scholarship, which enabled him to spend the summer in Italy, France, Germany and the Netherlands. He returned to North Carolina in 1929 and married a dance teacher in 1930. He spent the rest of his life in North Carolina and died in Raleigh in 1989. He founded and single-handedly taught at the Southern School of Creative Arts in Raleigh but the Great Depression caused most of the students to leave. In the mid-1930s he joined the Works Progress Administration's Federal Arts Project, for which he created murals in his native state and directed the Raleigh Art Center. He also taught at North Carolina State University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. McLean used impressionism and more avant-garde methods in his work, experimenting with techniques of decorative patterning while maintaining realism. While he also created figure studies and portraits, his favourite motif was the landscape that surrounded his North Carolina home. He enrolled as a pupil in the studio of the well-known sculptor Albert-Ernest Carrier-Belleuse in Paris. He was caught up in the Franco-Prussian War (1870-71) and during the siege of Paris he almost starved and came close to being shot as a spy. He escaped through the French and Prussian lines in November 1870 and returned to London, where he seems to have spent the rest of his life. His listed works consist mainly of busts (including one of Robert Burns) and statuettes. He was also the sculptor of the white marble bas-relief panels decorating the pulpit in St Peter's Church, Notting Hill, depicting significant times in the life of St Peter - The Call of St Peter, The Trial of Faith and The Charge (see Clan Maclean Map of London). In addition to exhibiting at the annual exhibition of the Royal Glasgow Institute of the Fine Arts (four times) and at the Royal Scottish

Academy Exhibition (once), he exhibited at the annual Summer Exhibition of the Royal Academy of Arts in London no less than 18 times. He was however unsuccessful in his attempt to be nominated as an associate of the Royal Academy in 1878, despite being proposed by Thomas Woolner and seconded by Lawrence Alma-Tadema.

He was a friend of American artist James Abbott McNeill Whistler and French artist Théodore Roussel (both of whom settled in London). He married Katherine Anne ??? (1868-1950) early in 1894, just a few months before his death in November of that year. She was the grand-daughter of the artist John Linnell. She and her second husband, Thomas Henry Riches, donated numerous pictures to the Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge, of which ten Whistler prints and two prints by Theodore Roussel are likely to have come from her first husband's collection: the pair by Roussel bear dedications from the artist to MacLean, and three of the Whistlers have inscriptions by Maclean.

Christopher Maclaine (1923-1975) USA	Beat poet and avant-garde film-maker Born in Oklahoma in 1923, Maclaine graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1946 and soon founded a small literary magazine called <i>Contour</i>. He also published his poetry in other small magazines and in several small-press books, the last in 1960. Frequently broke and dependent on friends, he cultivated the image of the mad artist. Married four times Died at home on Beverly Hills on 9 July 1967. He is buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, California. After a career in bond sales, he enrolled in the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. Previous to his screen career he played juvenile leads in stock and supported stage actress Maude Adams in <i>Peter Pan</i>. His first film was 1914's <i>As Ye Sow</i> with Alice Brady, followed by bit parts in <i>Fuss and Feathers</i>, and two Mary Pickford features, <i>Captain Kidd, Jr.</i> and <i>Johanna Enlists</i>. He went on appearing with Dorothy Gish in <i>The Hun Within</i>, he co-starred with Doris May in the romantic comedy, <i>23½ Hours Leave</i>, which was a big hit. From 1922 to 1929 he starred in fourteen features for Paramount and First National, all maintaining the standard light romantic comedy formula that continued to prove successful for him. He made one talkie, <i>Divorce Made Easy</i> in 1929, and then retired from acting In 1932 Douglas made his debut as a producer with <i>Ladies of the Jury</i>. He produced a total of eight films for Paramount, including <i>Tillie and Gus</i>, starring W.C. Fields, <i>Ladies Should Listen</i> starring Cary Grant and 1935's <i>Two for Tonight</i>. He retired from film producing in 1937, but continued to freelance write for movies and television in the 1940s and 1950s.

From an appearance in the pilot for <i>Fantasy Island</i> to a role in the enduring daytime soap opera <i>Days of Our Lives</i>, MacLean could always be counted upon to liven up what might otherwise have been incidental roles. In the 1976 frightener <i>Squirm</i> MacLean pinned a badge to his chest as the sheriff who must help to save a small community from carnivorous worms. In the 1980s MacLean's onscreen career began to slow, though in the next decade his position in front of and behind the scenes of Disneyland Paris' Buffalo Bill's Wild West found the ageing actor as in-demand as ever. MacLean would ultimately appear in a staggering 1,800 performances in Buffalo Bill mode, even performing at the base of the Eiffel Tower as the real Buffalo Bill had done 100 years previously. Born as Shirley MacLean Beaty (named after Shirley Temple) on 24 April 1934 in Richmond, Virginia. Her father, Ira Owens Beaty, was a professor of psychology, public school administrator, and real estate agent. Her mother, Kathlyn Corinne (née MacLean), was a drama teacher born in Nova Scotia, Canada. Married businessman Steve Parker in 1954; divorced in 1982.

Initially a ballet dancer, she became too tall and changed to Broadway dancing before becoming an actress. She attended Washington-Lee High School, where she was on the cheerleading squad and acted in the school's productions. The summer before her senior year, she was in New York to try acting on Broadway with some success. After she graduated, she returned and within a year she became an understudy to actress Carol Haney in *The Pajama Game*; Haney broke her ankle, and MacLaine replaced her. A few months after, with Haney still out of commission, film producer Hal B. Wallis was in the audience, took note of MacLaine, and signed her to work for Paramount Pictures. She later sued Wallis over a contractual dispute, a suit that is credited with ending the old-style studio star system of actor management.

MacLaine in her debut film *The Trouble with Harry* (1955) MacLaine made her debut in the Alfred Hitchcock film *The Trouble with Harry* (1955), for which she won the Golden Globe Award for New Star Of The Year - Actress. In 1956, she had roles in *Hot Spell* and *Around the World in Eighty Days*. At the same time, she starred in *Some Came Running*, the film that gave her her first Academy Award nomination - one of five that the film received - and a Golden Globe nomination.

Her second nomination came two years later for *The Apartment*, starring with Jack Lemmon. The film won 5 Oscars, including Best Director for Billy Wilder. She later said, "I thought I would win for *The Apartment*, but then Elizabeth Taylor had a tracheotomy". She starred in *The Children's Hour* (1961) also starring Audrey Hepburn, based on the play by Lillian Hellman. She was again nominated, this time for *Irma la Douce* (1963), for which she reunited with Wilder and Lemmon. Don Siegel her director on *Two Mules for Sister Sara* (1970) in which she starred opposite Clint Eastwood, once said, "It's hard to feel any great warmth to her. She's too unfeminine and has too much balls. She's very, very hard."

In 1975, she received a nomination for Best Documentary Feature for her documentary film *The Other Half of the Sky: A China Memoir*. Two years later, she was once again nominated for *The Turning Point* co-starring Anne Bancroft, in which she portrayed a retired ballerina much like herself. In 1983 she won her first Oscar for *Terms of Endearment*. The film won another four Oscars; one for Jack Nicholson and three for director James L. Brooks. In 1988, MacLaine won a Golden Globe for Best Actress (Drama) for *Madame Sousatzka*.

She continued to star in major films, such as *Steel Magnolias* with Julia Roberts. She made her feature-film directorial debut in *Bruno*, MacLaine starred as Helen in this film, which was released to video as *The Dress Code*. In 2007 she completed *Closing the Ring*, directed by Richard Attenborough and starring Christopher Plummer. Other notable films in which MacLaine has starred include *Sweet Charity* (1968), *Being There* (1979) with Peter Sellers, *Postcards From the Edge* (1990) with actress Meryl Streep, playing a fictionalized version of Debbie Reynolds with a screenplay by Reynolds's daughter, Carrie Fisher, *Used People* with

	Jessica Tandy and Kathy Bates, Guarding Tess (1994) with Nicolas Cage, Rumor Has It... (2005) with Kevin Costner and Jennifer Aniston and In Her Shoes with Cameron Diaz. MacLaine has also appeared in numerous television projects including an autobiographical miniseries based upon the book Out on a Limb, The Salem Witch Trials, These Old Broads written by Carrie Fisher and co-starring Elizabeth Taylor, Debbie Reynolds, and Joan Collins, and Coco, a Lifetime production based on the life of Coco Chanel. Colonel Angus Boyd Maclean (1924-2001)		Founder and first Chief of the Metro Transit police department in the Washington, DC, area Born on 12 July 1924 in Lorain, Ohio. He entered the Army in 1943 and served in the 3rd Infantry Division during the Battle of Anzio in World War II. He rose through the ranks from private to staff sergeant, earning two Purple Heart awards. He also received a Combat Infantryman's Badge. He received the Silver Star for eliminating two enemy machine gun emplacements by directing machine gun fire from an exposed observation post. Early in 1945 he received a battlefield commission on the basis of his leadership skills.

After the war, he was assigned to the 14th Constabulary and then transferred to the Military Police Corps. Also, while still in the Army, he graduated from the University of Maryland and the Blackstone School of Law in Chicago. He served two tours of duty in Vietnam during the war there. On his return to the USA he became Provost Marshal for the Headquarters, Military District of Washington, DC, overseeing the cooperation between local and military police agencies while they were dealing with the numerous protests during this time.

On 8 August 1971, an alert call was received, stating that a man was threatening to blow up the Capitol Building with nitroglycerin. Colonel MacLean rushed to the scene and advanced alone to the individual. Just a few months prior, on 1

March 1971, a bomb had exploded in the men's room on the Senate side of the Capitol. It destroyed the restroom and a barbershop, with no injuries. Fully aware of the danger, Colonel MacLean pushed onward and spoke to the individual for thirty minutes, finally convincing the man to relinquish his explosives. He received the Soldier's Medal for his efforts in disarming the bomber.

He began his career with Metro in 1972 as director of the office of security. He helped establish the procedures for what was then an interim special police force and recruited heavily from Washington area police agencies and the military. In 1976 the police force became the Metro Transit Police, responsible for protecting Metro passengers, workers, stations and revenues. He served as the department's Chief until 1990.

He married firstly Katherine MacLean, by whom he had two children, Douglas and Sandy. After divorcing Katherine he married secondly Sally MacLean, by whom he had a son, Aaron MacLean.

He died at his home in Burke, Virginia, on 11 January 2001 and was buried with full military honours in Arlington National Cemetery.

Admitted to the bar in 1807, he began a law practice in Wilmington, Delaware. During the War of 1812 McLane joined the Wilmington Artillery Company. It saw no action, and McLane left the unit as a 1st Lieutenant.

McLane was first elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1816, where he remained through five re-elections until 1826 and where he became Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee. He moved to the U.S. Senate and served there from 4 March 1827 until 29 April 1829. He resigned from the Senate in 1829 to serve as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United Kingdom. He then returned from England and served as Secretary to the Treasury from 8 August 1831 to 28 May 1833. From 29 May 1833 until 30 June 1834 he served as U.S. Secretary of State. In 1845-1846 he returned to England as Minister Plenipotentiary.

He was President of the Morris Canal and Banking Company for one year in (???). He then became President of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad until his retirement on 13 September 1848.

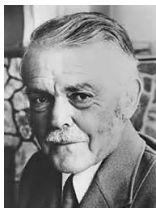

A Progressive Conservative, McLean was appointed Minister of Education in the minority government of Dufferin Roblin. He retained this position after Roblin's Tories won a majority government in 1959, and was responsible for overseeing the consolidation of several school boards. On 9 December 1963, McLean was shifted to the office of Attorney-General. He held this position until 22 July 1966, when he was appointed Provincial Secretary and Minister of Public Works. Ideologically, McLean was a representative of the Progressive Conservative Party's right wing, and had difficulty accepting some of Dufferin Roblin's more innovative policies (for instance, "shared services" for separate schools). When Roblin moved to federal politics in 1967, McLean was one of four candidates who sought to replace him. He placed third on the first ballot with 87 votes, and was eliminated on the second after falling to 73. Most of his supporters voted for Weir, the winning candidate, on the third and final ballot. Weir initially kept McLean as Provincial Secretary and Public Works Minister, but shifted him to the Ministry of Transportation on 24 September 1968.

	Weir's Tories were defeated by Edward Schreyer's New Democrats in 1969. McLean was personally defeated in by New Democrat Peter Burtniak, after a recount, by 41 votes. He did not return to provincial politics after this. After leaving politics, he served as a judge in Saskatchewan, retiring in 1983. McLean died at home in Dauphin in 1996. Allan McLean New Zealand 24 May 1822 – 1907	Sheep farmer and philanthropist. Allan McLean was one of the major runholders and one of the wealthiest men in Canterbury during the early years of settlement. The runs acquired by Allan and his brothers eventually totalled 370,000 acres, the largest in New Zealand at that time. The land was repossessed by the Government in 1899 and Allan Maclean moved to Christchurch, where in Manchester Street he built a large mansion called Holly Lea, holly being the badge plant of the McLean clan and also a symbol of domestic harmony. He provided in his will for the establishment of the McLean Institute, using his house "as a home for women of refinement and education in reduced or straitened circumstances". The Institute was incorporated by act of Parliament, the McLean Institute Act 1909. As his will also allowed his housekeeper to remain in Holly Lea during her lifetime, the Governors of the Institute bought another property at 123 Fendalton Road. After the housekeeper's death, the original mansion was sold to the Government and in June 1957 the name "Holly Lea" was officially transferred to the Fendalton Road property, where the Institute remains.
Allan M. A. McLean (1891-1969) Canada	Businessman and politician Born on 27 September 1891 in Bristol, New Brunswick, Allan Marcus Atkinson McLean was the younger brother of Alexander Neil McLean (q.v.). In 1923 he and his brother, with a group of investors, took control of the Connors Bros. fish processing business that had been founded in Blacks Harbour, New Brunswick by Lewis and Patrick Connors in 1894. Much of the McLean brothers' lives were spent developing the fishing industry centred around New Brunswick's Passamaquoddy Bay in southwestern New Brunswick. Largely focused on canning herring, Connors Brothers also served the north-eastern United States' Roman Catholic 'fish on Friday' market by shipping haddock and pollock to New England markets. Connors Brothers was sold to the George Weston Limited conglomerate headquartered in Toronto in approximately 1966 as Neil and Allan McLean approached 80 years of age. A member of the Liberal Party of Canada, Allan was elected to the Canadian House of Commons on 18 June 1962 in the riding of Charlotte County, New Brunswick. 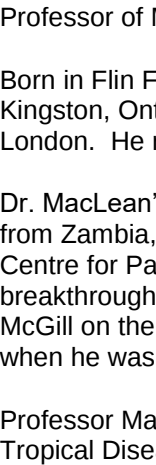

He was concurrently the Assistant Dean of Research for 5 years for both the UBC Faculty of Medicine and the Vancouver Hospital and Health Sciences Centre, and then the Senior Associate Dean of the Faculty of Medicine. Dr. McLean is currently a Professor of Dermatology and is on active staff at the British Columbia Cancer Agency, where he heads up Cancer Prevention. Dr. McLean has a special interest in the advancement of global learning and training in dermatology, and to that end was a Founding Senior Associate Editor for the Canadian Journal of Dermatology and Founding Editor for the Dermatology Times of Canada. He pioneered interactive teaching in 1994 as the author of the CD-ROM entitled Illustrated Synopsis of Dermatology: Diagnosis and Treatment. He is Secretary-General of the International Foundation for Dermatology, which is active in enhancing dermatology training and care in Africa, and is a Board member of the International League of Dermatologic Societies. He was unsuccessful in the Regina federal constituency for the Progressives in 1921 and for the CCF in 1935. He retired to California because of ill health in 1938, but remained an “eminence grise” to the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation (CCF). His speech on “Medical Health Service” to the CCF provincial convention in Regina on July 13, 1944, was a precursor to the Sigerist report; MacLean supported Sigerist’s appointment. MacLean had observed how the economic Depression resulted in inadequate medical care and he became an ardent supporter of ‘socialized medicine.’ Sigerist’s report was based on MacLean’s recommendations and became the basis for legislation that enacted Canada’s first free hospitalization plan, which provided the blueprint for medical care in Saskatchewan for the next half century. MacLean was later described by Saskatchewan Premier T.C. In 2006, his group moved into complex trait genetics with their discovery of the major gene responsible for atopic eczema, asthma and allergy – filaggrin – a gene in which about 10% of the human population carry loss-of-function mutations that strongly predispose to atopic disease. This work has won a number of national and international research prizes. He has recently relocated to the Division of Molecular Medicine, College of Life Sciences, University of Dundee. 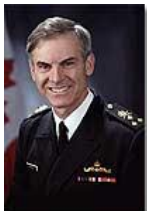

He completed post-graduate training at McGill, and then went on to study tropical medicine at the University of London. He returned to McGill University as a faculty member in the mid 1970s. Dr. MacLean's boundless enthusiasm and dedication to tropical medicine spanned more than 40 years and numerous countries, from Zambia, Kenya, Malaysia, Indonesia, Japan and Ethiopia through to the Caribbean. He helped create the National Reference Centre for Parasitology, co-founded the Canadian University Consortium for Health in Development, contributed important research breakthroughs in malaria and other epidemic diseases, and invented the McGill Centre for Tropical Medicine. His tireless efforts put McGill on the map as one of the foremost tropical disease units in North America. His expertise was formally recognized in 2006 when he was asked to serve as the President of the Clinical Group of the American Society of Tropical Medicine & Hygiene. Professor Maclean died on January 22, 2009. The McGill Centre for Tropical Diseases was renamed the J.D. MacLean Centre for Tropical Diseases in his honour.

He entered the Navy, October 24, 1798, as First-Class Volunteer, on board Terpsichore, 32, Captain W. H. Gage, employed in the Mediterranean and then in the Channel, where, from October 1800 until April 1802, he served as Midshipman in Atlas, 98, Captain T. Jones. In October, 1803, he re-embarked on board Leopard, 60, Captain J. N. Morris ; on accompanying whom into Colossus, 74, he received, in the battle of Trafalgar, a severe wound [he lost his left arm] ; a gratuity from the Patriotic Fund was his reward. He removed, in December, 1805, to Camilla, 20, Captain J. Tower, but had not been many months in that vessel before he was promoted, July 7, 1806, to the rank of Lieutenant, and re-appointed to Colossus, commanded at first by Capt. Morris, and subsequently by Capt. T. Alexander. In November, 1808, we find him serving on shore under Earl Dundonald, at the celebrated defence of the fortress of Rosas, on the north-eastern extremity of Spain. He commanded a gun-boat also during the siege of Cadiz by the French; and on December 1, 1811, he assisted at the capture and destruction of part of an enemy's convoy, protected by several armed vessels, near Rochelle. His health at length obliging him to leave Colossus in September, 1813, after he has been altogether for nearly nine years attached to her, he was next appointed to—January 31, and October 31, 1814, to the Royal Sovereign, 100, Captains T. G. Caulfield, Chas. T. Smith, and R. Lambert, and Stork, sloop, Captain R. Lisle Coulson, in which vessels he served in the Mediterranean and North Sea until September 18, 1815—and, November 26, 1822, as Senior, to Gloucester, 74, bearing the broad pendant of Sir Edward W. C. R. Owen in the West Indies. He was there promoted to the command, July 1, 1823, of Bustard, 10. He removed, in the following October, to Carnation, 18, and after cruising with activity in the suppression of piracy, returned home, and was paid off in July, 1825. From October 1, 1841, until December 1, 1843, Com. Maclean was Superintendent of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company in the West Indies; and at the time of his death he was the Examiner at the Dublin Marine Board." The Simon Tesler article states that "According to the British Naval Biographical Dictionary of 1849, he married in Sept 1829 and had one son and one daughter. His son appears to have been Charles Rawden Maclean (1815-1880) later a celebrated adventurer and writer (under the name "John Ross")." The online version of this Dictionary does not however mention this marriage. Also, it seems unlikely that this marriage on 1829 would have produced a son born in 1815. Sir Fitzroy Donald Maclean (1835-1936) UK	Soldier and for 53 years the 26th Clan Chief, he bought back and restored Duart Castle. Born on 18 May 1835, only son of Sir Charles Fitzroy Maclean, 9th Baronet, the 25th Chief of Clan Maclean, and Emily Marsham. Married Constance Marianne Ackers (c1840–1920) on 17 January 1872, by whom he had four sons and a daughter. Died at Duart on 22 November 1936 (aged 101) He started his military career as a Coronet at the 7th Dragoon Guards. On 12 October 1852 was promoted to Lieutenant of the 13th Light Dragoons. In 1854 he was promoted to Captain and in 1856 was promoted to Major. In 1861 he was promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel. By 1871 he was commanding the 13th Hussars. He was promoted to Colonel and commanded the Queen's Own West Kent Yeomanry Cavalry in 1880. In 1854–1855, he served in Bulgaria and the Crimea, and was with his regiment at the landing at Eupatoria. He was in the Battle of the Alma on 20 September 1854. He participated in the Charge of the Light Brigade on 25 October 1854. He was also at the Siege of Sevastopol. He became the 10th Baronet of Morvern and 26th Clan Chief in 1883 on the death of his father. On 11 September 1911 he bought and then restored Duart Castle. In August 1912, to mark the re-opening of the castle, he

	hosted the first International Gathering of the Clan Maclean. He was Grand President of the Clan Gillean Association, honorary president of the Mull and Iona Association, vice-president and formerly president of the Highland Society of London. He was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant for Argyllshire in 1932. He was invested as a Civil Companion of the Order of the Bath on the 22 June 1897. On 24 June 1904, he was again invested, this time as a Knight Commander, in the Civil Division of Order of the Bath. He was succeeded as Chief of the Clan Maclean by his grandson, Sir Charles Hector Fitzroy Maclean (qv), his sons having predeceased him. See The Clan Gillean, p. 472

Major-General Francis MacLean (c1717-1781) UK	Scottish soldier and governor Born c 1717 Died in Halifax, Nova Scotia, on 4 May 1781 General Francis Maclean, of the family of Blaich, as soon as he was able to bear arms, obtained a commission in the same regiment with his father; was at the defence of Bergen-op Zoom in 1747, and was detained prisoner in France for some time was appointed captain in the 2nd battalion of the 42nd Highlanders on its being raised in October, 1758. At the capture of the island of Guadaloupe, he was severely wounded, but owing to his gallant conduct was promoted to the rank of major, and appointed governor of the island of Marie Galante. In January, 1761, he exchanged into the 97th regiment, and April 13, 1762, was appointed lieutenant-colonel in the army. In the war in Canada, he commanded a body of troops under General Wolfe, and participated in the capture of Montreal. He was sent, in 1762, to aid the Portuguese against the combined attack of France and Spain, and was made commander of Almeida, a fortified town on the Spanish frontier, which he held for several years; and on being promoted to the rank of major-general, was nominated to the government of Estremadura and the city of Lisbon. On leaving Portugal in 1778, the king presented him with a handsomely mounted sword, and the queen gave him a valuable

diamond ring.

On his return to England—having been gazetted colonel of the 82nd foot, December 16, 1777—he was immediately dispatched with a corps of the army for America, and appointed to the government of Halifax in Nova Scotia, where he held the rank of brigadier-general. During the month of June, 1779, with a part of his army, General Maclean repaired to the Penobscot, and there proceeded to erect defenses. The American army under General Lovell, from Boston, appeared in the bay on July 28th, and began to erect batteries for a siege. Commodore Sir George Collier, August 13th, entered the bay with a fleet and raised the siege. General Maclean returned to Halifax, where he died, May 4, 1781, in the sixty-fourth year of his age, and unmarried.

Lieutenant Hector L. S. Maclean VC (1870-1897)	The only Maclean to have received the Victoria Cross, the highest and most prestigious award for gallantry in the face of the enemy that can be awarded to British and Commonwealth forces ¹ .
UK	Born on 13 September 1870, Hector Lachlan Stewart MacLean was the son of Major-General Charles Smith Maclean, CB CIE (q.v.). He was educated at Fettes College. He was 26 years old, and a lieutenant in the Staff Corps and Corps of Guides, Indian Army during the Tirah Campaign, India when the following deed took place for which he was awarded the VC. On 17 August 1897 at Nawa Kili, Upper Swat, India, Lieutenant Maclean, with two other officers (Robert Bellew Adams and Viscount, Alexander Edward Murray Fincastle) and five men of the Guides, went under a heavy and close fire, to the rescue of a lieutenant of the Lancashire Fusiliers who was lying disabled by a bullet wound and surrounded by enemy swordsmen. While the wounded officer was being brought under cover he was unfortunately killed by a bullet. Lieutenant Maclean was mortally wounded and four of the horses were shot. His citation read:

¹ There is however a close Maclean, specifically MacLaine of Lochbuie, connection with two other recipients of the Victoria Cross. Vice-Admiral Gordon Campbell, VC, DSO and two bars (1886-1953), had a MacLaine mother: he was the eighth son of Col Frederick Campbell (1843-1926), 8th of Airds, who in 1869 had married Emilie Guillaumine MacLaine, eldest daughter of Donald MacLaine, 26th of Lochbuie. Gordon Campbell was awarded a VC while commanding a Q-ship in 1917. Brigadier Lorne MacLaine Campbell, VC, DSO and bar (1902-1991), was the eldest son of Frederick Campbell's second son, Ian Maxwell Campbell, and thus had a MacLaine grandmother. He was awarded his VC while commanding the 7th Battalion of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders in Tunisia in 1943.

It should also be noted that Major-General Charles Smith Maclean (qv) was recommended for the Victoria Cross for his heroism in Delhi on 14 September 1857 during the Indian Mutiny, but was not awarded the honour as no superior officer was present during the action.

	During the fighting at Nawa Bali, in Upper Swat, on the 17th August, 1897, Lieutenant-Colonel R. B. Adams proceeded with Lieutenants H. L. S. MacLean and Viscount Fincastle, and five men of the Guides, under a very heavy and close fire, to the rescue of Lieutenant R. T. Greaves, Lancashire Fusiliers, who was lying disabled by a bullet wound and surrounded by the enemy's swordsmen. In bringing him under cover he (Lieutenant Greaves) was struck by a bullet and killed - Lieutenant MacLean was mortally wounded - whilst the horses of Lieutenant-Colonel Adams and Lieutenant Viscount Fincastle were shot, as well as two troop horses. His medal is now part of the Lord Ashcroft Collection and is on display at the Imperial War Museum in London. There is a commemorative plaque in his memory in the National Army Museum in London. Lieutenant-Colonel Adams and Lieutenant Viscount Fincastle were both also awarded the Victoria Cross, making this incident the first time that three VCs had been won by members of the same regiment on the same day. Captain Ivan Clarkson Maclean, DSO, MC (d 1918) UK	Captain Ivan C Maclean, DSO, MC and Bar gave up a private practice in London to join the Royal Army Medical Corps in August 1914 and had a distinguished career, being attached to the Rifle Brigade. He won the MC at Neuve Chapelle in May 1915 for tending the wounded under fire, when almost all of his aid-post were killed, and the Bar for similar work at the Battle of the Somme. In August 1917 he was awarded the DSO and was severely wounded at the Battle of Ypres. After his recovery he rejoined the Rifle Brigade and went through the severe fighting from March 21 to 24, 1918, when he was wounded and captured. He died of wounds on April 4, 1918, whilst in enemy hands. He was also mentioned in despatches four times. (Authority The Times May 31, 1918). The London Gazette for January 9, 1918, records that the DSO was awarded to Captain Ivan C Maclean, MC for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in clearing the wounded. He took his stretcher bearers well in advance of our forward positions and behaved with the most exemplary courage and devotion throughout, sparing no efforts to collect the wounded men. After his battalion was relieved he continued to work under the heaviest fire for another twenty-four hours and was severely

	wounded on his way back after all the cases had been cleared. Ivan as well as all his other talents, was very musical and won a Daily Mail national competition for the composition of a new waltz. USA	He was commissioned a second lieutenant and awarded a Bachelor of Science degree from the United States Military Academy in 1958. He also holds a Master of Science degree in Petroleum Management from the University of Kansas. His military education includes completion of the Infantry Officer Basic Course, the Quartermaster Officer Advanced Course, the United States Army Command and General Staff College, and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. Appointed Quartermaster General in June 1987 and served until July 1989. (The Quartermaster Corps is the U.S. Army's oldest logistics branch, established 16 June 1775.) Other key assignments held include duty as Commander, 13th Support Command, Fort Hood; Commander, 200th Theater Army Materiel Management Center, Zweibruecken, Germany; and Commander, Defense Industrial Supply Center in Philadelphia. He was the Chief of Petroleum for the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics, United States Army Pacific, after which he performed duty as a logistics operations officer with the 46th Support Group at Fort Bragg. While at Fort Bragg, he commanded the 530th Supply and Service Battalion. Reassigned to Washington, General McLean served as a Personnel Management Officer in the Colonels Division at the United States Army Military Personnel Center. Following attendance at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, he was a Joint Staff Action Officer, and later Chief of the Logistics Posture Branch with the J4 (Logistics) Directorate, Joint Chiefs of Staff. Awards and decorations which General McLean has received include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star Medal, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (with Oak Leaf Cluster), and the Army Commendation Medal (with Oak Leaf Cluster). He also earned the Expert Infantry Badge, the Parachutist Badge, the Parachute Rigger Badge, and the Ranger Tab. Wing-Commander Charles Hector MacLean, LLB AE DL (1913-2007) UK	Battle of Britain pilot and lawyer Charles Hector MacLean was born in Glasgow on 9th December 1913. He was educated at St Ninians Preparatory School in Moffat, Canford School in Dorset and Glasgow University, graduating with a Law degree in 1935. Shortly afterwards, following in the steps of his uncle, Brigadier-General Campbell MacLean (see above), he was accepted for service with No 602 Squadron, the local Auxiliary Air Force Squadron, and trained as a pilot to fly Hawker Hind biplane bombers from Abbotsinch, near Glasgow. He was commissioned in March 1936. Shortly afterwards the squadron was converted to a fighter unit on Hawker Harts. His commanding officer was Squadron Leader the Marquess of Clydesdale, later the Duke of Hamilton, the person whom Rudolf Hess was trying to reach when he flew to Scotland in 1941 (see below). At the outbreak of war all the auxiliary squadrons were incorporated into the RAF, by which time No 602 was equipped with Spitfires. On 2nd December 1939 MacLean shared in the downing of a Heinkel 111, which was laying mines near the Isle of May. The following July he helped bring down a Junkers 88 bomber. In August 1940 the squadron moved south to Westhampnett, near Chichester, and on 18th August MacLean damaged a Stuka dive-bomber. On 26th August he was scrambled as a flight commander with the squadron to intercept two heavily escorted enemy formations of Heinkel III and DO17 bombers over the Channel. In the ensuing mêlée he was severely wounded and unable to bale out, but managed to return and belly-land his badly damaged aircraft at Tangmere. His injuries resulted in the loss of his right leg below the knee. Although no longer able to fly on operations, he continued to fly for the remainder of the war. He held a number of senior appointments in the rank of squadron leader and, latterly, wing commander. Towards the end of the war, after a tour as senior controller in Northern Ireland, he was one of the group of senior controllers responsible for the air defences of London and south-east England. On 10th May 1941 MacLean was the flight controller on duty covering Ayrshire and South-West Scotland when the Messerschmitt

Bf 110 being flown by Rudolf Hess, Adolf Hitler's Deputy in the Nazi Party, was spotted approaching the Northumberland coast and then tracked as it flew towards Glasgow. Although MacLean scrambled a fighter to intercept, Hess baled out and his aircraft crashed before it could be intercepted. MacLean then had the task of reporting to his former commanding officer, the Duke of Hamilton, that Hess was at Eaglesham Police Station asking to speak to him. Another Maclean (see [here](#)) had been the first on the scene of Hess' arrival.

When the Auxiliary Air Force re-formed in 1947, MacLean was appointed the first commanding officer of No 3602 Fighter Control Unit at Bishopbriggs, near Glasgow. He retired as a wing commander and received the Air Efficiency Award and Clasp in recognition of his service in the RAuxAF. He was a devoted member of the No 602 Squadron Association and gave much support to the establishment of the squadron's museum in Glasgow. In 1999 he wrote *Fighters in Defence, Memories of the Glasgow Squadron*.

After the war he joined the family law firm, Montgomerie Flemings Fyfe MacLean & Co (now called, after several mergers, BMK Wilson), ultimately becoming Senior Partner. He was also: Chairman (1964-1994) of the Association for the Relief of Incurables in Glasgow and the West of Scotland, a charity in which his family had been involved since its foundation in the late 19th century; Deputy Lieutenant of Renfrewshire (1987-1999); Vice-President, Officers Association, Scottish Branch (1983-1997).

He was active in the Clan Maclean Association. Following the example of his father, William MacLean, who had been involved in the purchase of the land surrounding Duart Castle for Sir Fitzroy, Hector provided legal assistance to the Association until well into the 1960s. He was also its Secretary and Treasurer for many years. In [year] he was made Honorary Vice-President in recognition of his long service to the Association.

He married first, in 1941, Marcia Dods, by whom he had two sons, Donald and Marcus. By his second wife, Rachael Hutchesson, whom he married in 1949, he had a daughter, Jane, and another son, Charles. Marcus and Donald have been the editors of the International BattleAxe since [year] and were the editors of the Clan Maclean Magazine from 2005 to 2010.

Hector MacLean died on 19th July 2007.

His name (shown as F/Lt. C H MacLEAN) is among those listed on the Battle of Britain London Monument. This monument, unveiled in 2005, is sited on the Victoria Embankment, on the north bank of the Thames, about 200 yards from Westminster Bridge (see [Clan Maclean Map of London](#)).

Alexander McLean	Founder of the African Prisons Project
UK	The African Prisons Project was founded in 2004 by Alexander McLean, then aged 19. Whilst volunteering in a hospital in Kampala, Uganda, in his gap year, Alexander met a group of prisoners from Luzira Upper Prison. This prompted him to visit their prison. Disturbed by the conditions which the prisoners had to endure, he returned a few months later to renovate the prison's infirmary. This has resulted in a significant drop in death rates and since completion of the project by APP the prison service have added an on-site laboratory. On completion of the project, Alexander asked the prisoners if there was anything else they needed. The resounding response was education. So he returned for a second time and developed a library with books donated from the UK. This has enabled prisoners to learn to read, to take O Levels and A Levels, and even start a distance learning course with Kampala University. Since then, APP has completed other projects in Uganda, Sierra Leone and Kenya. In November 2007 Alexander was named 2007 Beacon Prize Overall Winner, the youngest ever recipient of this award. The Beacon Prize Awards honour outstanding individuals who have given money, time or skills to help causes that enrich our communities in a wide variety of powerful ways. Dorothy Jean Barker Maclean (c1906 -1999)	Lifelong learner and philanthropist
USA	Born in Denver, Colorado in 1906(?) Entered Colorado College, Colorado Springs, when she was 16. She earned a bachelor's degree in English and in 1926, at the age of 21, earned a master's degree in English from Smith College in Northampton, Mass. Married John A. MacLean Jr, the son of the co-founder of the Maclean-Fogg Company. They had 3 children. At her death, Dorothy had 12 grandchildren and 10 great-grand-children. Long-time resident of Winnetka, Illinois Died from pneumonia on 24 February 1999 at University of Chicago Hospital In 1925, she settled in Wyoming to teach in a one-room schoolhouse before marrying John A. MacLean Jr. (q.v.) and moving to the Chicago area. He died in 1986. She was a lifelong learner and well-known philanthropist, having served on the Winnetka School Board and participated in a number of educational initiatives at the University of Chicago, Dartmouth College, Smith College, Colorado College, The Newberry Library, the Young Artists Programs at Ravinia, The School of the Art Institute and Chicago Symphony. At Colorado College she founded a visiting professorship and biannual symposium in English literature. She also established the

	D.J. MacLean Endowed Fund for English at the College. At the University of Chicago she helped to fund the creation of the Maclean Center for Clinical Medical Ethics at the University of Chicago. Founded in 1984, the MacLean Center was the nation's first program devoted to clinical medical ethics. It now claims to be the leading program in the USA devoted to the study and teaching of clinical ethics. The Center organises an annual Fellows Conference in her memory, now in its 22nd year. She was the wife of the late John A. MacLean Jr.; mother of David Barker (Carol) MacLean, Barry Lee (Mary Ann) MacLean and the late John A. III (Joy) MacLean; grandmother of 12; and great-grandmother of 10. Sir Douglas Maclean (1852-1929) New Zealand	Benefactor and philanthropist Born in Wellington in 1852, son of Sir Donald McLean (q.v.) and Susan, née Strang. Educated at Auckland Grammar School and then Clifton College in the UK. Studied law and was articled to a Wellington firm, Hart and Buckley. He completed his studies in England and was admitted as a barrister at the Middle Temple. He did not practice, but returned to New Zealand and took up the work of sheep-farming and stock-breeding on the afterwards famous Maraekakaho estate. Married Florence Butler-Storey in [date]. They had one son, Captain Algernon Donald Douglas McLean of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, who died in 1923 from the effect of wounds suffered in the First World War. Their eldest daughter married Vice-Admiral Fountaine of Narford Hall, Norfolk. Represented Napier in the House of Representatives for one term (1896-1899). President of the Wellington Branch of the Navy League, and a member since the foundation of the league; Vice-President of the London executive during the war period; was elected President for New Zealand at the Dominion Conference in 1922; and was the first President of the Hawke's Bay Branch. President of the Wellington Early Settlers' Association. In October 1877 he established the Te Makarini Trust for Te Aute Maori College and endowed it with £3,000 in memory of his father, who was called "Te Makarini" by the Maoris. The income has since provided annually a series of scholarships for gifted students from the primary native schools attending Te Aute College. In 1905 he and a syndicate of Napier men established a trust to raise money to buy land for public recreation. In 1910, ten acres of

	land was gifted by Sir Douglas as a memorial to his father. The land was officially named the 'Sir Donald McLean Park' by an act of Parliament in 1911. Today it is simply known as 'McLean Park'. McLean Park is now home to all the major representative and international Rugby, and cricket, played in Hawke's Bay and has also hosted fixtures for the FIFA World U17 Women's World Cup. He and his wife, Lady Florence, were largely instrumental in the building of the Hawke's Bay Museum and Art Gallery, both in terms of financial support and through the donation of their extensive collection of artefacts, antiques and archives. He was the first President of the Napier Society of Arts and Crafts. Died at Napier on 7 February 1929. Dorothy Maclean (1920-) Canada	Writer and educator on spiritual subjects, who was one of the original three adults at what is now the Findhorn Foundation in northeast Scotland. Born in Guelph, Ontario, Canada in 1920. She is still active in her career. She obtained a 3-year Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Western Ontario. From 1941 onwards she worked for the British Security Coordination in New York. After being posted to Panama, she met and married John Wood, though the couple would divorce in 1951. On her way to New York in 1941, Maclean had met Sheena Govan, and it was through Sheena Govan that she would later meet Peter Caddy. Living in England in the 1950s, Dorothy Maclean became involved in the spiritual practices of Sheena Govan and Peter and eventually Eileen Caddy. When the Caddys were appointed to manage a hotel in Scotland, Maclean joined them as the hotel's secretary. After the Caddys became unemployed in 1962 they moved into a travel trailer near the village of Findhorn. In 1963 an annex was built so that Dorothy Maclean could continue to work with them. A community eventually grew up around the Caddys and Dorothy Maclean, and this community has since 1972 been known as the Findhorn Foundation. Maclean is known for her work with devas, which here means the intelligences overseeing the natural world. Her book To hear the angels sing gives an overview of this work and also provides autobiographical materials. A full-length biography, <i>Memoirs of an Ordinary Mystic</i>, was published in 2010. Dorothy Maclean left Findhorn in 1973 and subsequently founded an educational organization in North America with David Spangler. John McLean UK/Canada 1828 – 7 November 1886	John McLean was born in Portsay, Banffshire, Scotland. He came to Canada after graduating from the University of Aberdeen and was ordained a priest in 1858. In 1866 he went to Winnipeg, then a village of 300, to assist his university friend, Bishop Robert Machray and become rector of St John's Cathedral. In 1874, largely through the representations of Bishop Machray, 2 new dioceses of Saskatchewan and Athabasca were created. The diocese of Saskatchewan covered the territories of Saskatchewan, Assiniboia and Alberta. John McLean was made Bishop of Saskatchewan and on May 3, 1874 consecrated in Lambeth, England. Bishop McLean began his work in the chiefly Indian diocese with no church and a staff of one priest, one native deacon and a catechist. He established Emmanuel College in 1879 to train natives for church work and at the time of his first Synod August 31, 1882 held in Prince Albert there was a clerical staff of 16. Bishop McLean throughout his episcopate had been very successful in raising funds from England and Eastern Canada. These funds were used to run all but 4 of the 22 missions in place at the time of John McLean's last Synod. Bishop John McLean travelled the diocese extensively, in winter by dog-sleigh and in summer by open boat. Lauchlan Maclean Watt, DD, LLD (1867-1957) UK	Lauchlan MacLean Watt (24 October 1867– 1957) was the minister of Glasgow Cathedral from 1923–34, and the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 1933. He was a published poet and author, and respected as a literary critic. Maclean Watt was born at Grantown-on-Spey, Morayshire, although his mother was a native of Skye, and he was educated at Edinburgh University (MA, BD). Licensed by the Presbytery of Dalkeith on 12 May 1896, he was minister of Turriff (1897–1901), of Alloa and Tullibody (1901–11), of St. Stephen's, Edinburgh (1911-23), and of the High Kirk known as Glasgow Cathedral (1923-34). In 1907 he accompanied the King of Denmark to Iceland as a correspondent for The Times, The Scotsman and The Manchester Guardian. During the War he was a chaplain with the Gordon Highlanders in the 7th Division, and he was sent by the Government as Commissioner to the US and Canada in 1918. He was a prolific author in prose and verse, on folk-lore, history and antiquities, especially Celtic and Gaelic as well as aspects of religion, literature and the life of a soldier, and gave the Warrack Lectures and McNeil-Frazer Lectures on preaching in 1930. He was Turnbull Trust preacher at The Scots' Church in Melbourne, Australia, in 1932.

Mary Ann MacLean (1931-2005)	Prostitute and co-founder of The Process Church of the Final Judgment
UK	In 1963 Mary Ann MacLean and Robert de Grimston, both former Scientologists, established a therapy business in Wigmore Street, London. Mary Ann MacLean was a former prostitute who grew up in poverty in Glasgow, while Robert de Grimston was from an upper class family and had served as an officer in the British army before becoming an architecture student and then dropping out three years into these studies. In turn de Grimston recruited Timothy Wyllie, whom he had met in 1959 when they both enrolled on the architectural course at Regent Street Polytechnic (now the University of Westminster), to act as a guinea pig for MacLean and

	de Grimston to test and develop techniques they'd learnt as Scientologists, adapting them to their own purposes. Wyllie's circle of student friends provided the initial recruits to what was then called Compulsions Analysis. In Wyllie's subsequent account ("Love Sex Fear Death: The Inside Story of the Process Church of the Final Judgment"), those involved with MacLean and de Grimston recognised a sense of spirituality in their activities and the name of the group was therefore changed to The Process in 1965. While Process acolytes panhandled for money and lived in abject poverty, the group rented properties it could barely afford in an attempt to trick the outside world into believing they possessed wealth and power. De Grimston and MacLean were the only Process members to live in style. While de Grimston provided the theology, MacLean was the real power running this cynical money-grabbing hierarchy. Over the years the group expanded and at various times had chapters in Rome, Paris, New Orleans, San Francisco, Munich, Los Angeles, Amsterdam, New York, Boston, Chicago, Toronto and Miami. Chapters were sometimes moved from one city to another, and the membership never seems to have stretched beyond the very low hundreds, although The Process claimed to have tens of thousands of members. The Process fell apart when de Grimston and MacLean ended their marital relationship in 1974. De Grimston attempted to revitalise The Process without success. MacLean led the disciples who stuck with her into The Foundation, which adopted increasingly conventional Christian doctrines before reinventing itself as a secular animal charity called Best Friends. MacLean died in 2005. De Grimston, but not Mary Ann MacLean, is mentioned in the "old history" of the Best Friends Animal Society. Roderick Edward McLean (d. 1921)	Roderick McLean attempted to assassinate Queen Victoria at Windsor railway station on 2 March 1882. He fired one shot at her (horse-drawn) carriage as she was leaving the station for Windsor Castle but was overpowered before he could fire another shot. This was apparently prompted by a rejection of some poetry that he had sent to her. He was tried for high treason on 20 April 1882. The jury found McLean "not guilty, but insane" and he lived out his remaining days in Broadmoor Asylum. He died on 9th June 1921.
UK	The verdict prompted Queen Victoria to request a change of law in order to deter similar attempts in future. In the following year the Trial of Lunatics Act 1883 was passed, under which those judged to have committed a crime while insane would be considered as "guilty, but insane", thus allowing them to be kept in custody as "criminal lunatics". Whether or not as the result, the attack by Roderick McLean was the last of eight unsuccessful attempts to assassinate Queen Victoria. It includes the lines: Maclean must be a madman, Which is obvious to be seen, Or else he wouldn't have tried to shoot Our most beloved Queen. Ironically, four years earlier, in June 1878, McGonagall himself had walked from his home town of Dundee to Balmoral, a distance of about 60 miles, with the intention of reciting his poems to Queen Victoria, but had been turned away by the constable at the lodge gate. Wallace H. MacLean Canada	 Wallace MacLean has spent a long career as a practicing geologist, educator and researcher. As a young Canadian geologist, he worked in northern Canada and in Arabia, and then returned to academia for graduate studies, followed by teaching and research at McGill University. Wallace studied mining geology and engineering at the Colorado School of Mines. Following graduation in 1955, he worked as a geologist at the United Keno Hill silver-lead-zinc mines at Mayo, Yukon. He then became economic geologist for the Directorate of Mineral Resources of Saudi Arabia for the next five years. Upon returning to Canada, he obtained a M.Sc. (MINEX) in 1964 and a Ph.D. in 1968 from McGill University, where he furthered his study in mineral exploration and research in economic geology. He joined the staff of the Department of Earth and Planetary Sciences at McGill in 1967 where he has been involved with many studies that have led to the discovery of a variety of massive sulphide and related ores. William Burdette McLean (1914-1976) USA	Weapons scientist who developed the Sidewinder missile The son of a Protestant clergyman, McLean attended Caltech, where he took three degrees in physics, finishing with a doctorate in 1939. McLean was married to Edith LaVerne "LaV" McLean (died December 19, 2007). During World War II, McLean worked on ordnance equipment and testing at the National Bureau of Standards in Washington, D.C. Following the war, he moved to the Naval Ordnance Test Station (NOTS), Inyokern, California (now the Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake), where he led the project team developing the Sidewinder heat-seeking missile from 1945 to 1954. The Sidewinder was the first truly effective air-to-air missile; its variants and upgrades are still in active service. In April 1954, he was appointed technical director, the senior civilian position at the Station, a position which he held till 1967. For his work on the Sidewinder, he was awarded \$25,000 and a plaque from President Eisenhower. He then served as technical director for the Navy's submarine-warfare research centre in San Diego until 1974. The Memorial Award for Dr. William B. McLean was established in 1968, to recognize creativity in employees who furthered the mission at China Lake with significant inventions. In 2008, the Navy announced that the dry cargo ship USNS William McLean (T-AKE-12) would be named in honour of Dr. McLean. South Africa	Born on 9 July 1930 in Pietermaritzberg, Natal Educated at Merchiston Preparatory School and Cordwalles Preparatory School, then Hilton College Died on 26 August 2007 in Johannesburg A right-handed batsman, his Test career spanned 13 years from 1951 to 1964 and he managed five centuries. His highest Test score came in 1955, when he scored 142 at Lord's against an England attack including Brian Statham and Fred Trueman. He first came to public attention in the fifth Test of the 1952-53 tour of Australia, when he made an unbeaten 76 in the fourth innings to lead South Africa to an astonishing series-levelling victory after the Aussies had scored 520. During the disastrous 1960 tour of England, only he and fast bowler Neil Adcock performed well and were named Wisden Cricketers of the Year as a result. During this tour he hit his highest first-class score of 207 against Worcestershire. In total during the tour he scored four centuries, made the most runs (1,516) and highest individual score of his side, was first to pass the thousand, recorded the fastest hundred of the season in seventy-five minutes against A.E.R. Gilligan's XI at Hastings and shared with G. Griffin the distinction of hitting the most 6's (eleven). A year later McLean led an unofficial tour to England by a team called the Fezelas. It proved to be the rebirth of South African cricket. No fewer than eight future Springboks were on board, including Eddie Barlow, Colin Bland, Peter Pollock and Denis Lindsay - Graeme Pollock just missed out, although everyone knew he was a future international. McLean is thus credited with being the father of the great Springbok teams of the 1960s that were prevented from testing themselves against the Rest of the World from 1970 onwards because of apartheid-induced isolation. He was also a fine rugby player for Natal and played against the Wallabies touring side in 1953. Source: ESPN Cricinfo

Allan MacLean (1891-1982) UK	Allan Maclean was born at Brue on the Island of Lewis on 20th April 1891, son of John MacLean who was a crofter and missionary. He was a native Gaelic speaker and learned songs, in the oral tradition, from his father and his neighbours. In 1906 he left for the Mainland to take up an apprenticeship as an engineering pattern maker with Rankin & Blackmore of Greenock. Later he worked for both Scott Shipbuilding and the Caledonian Foundry. Whilst living in Greenock he joined the Greenock Gaelic Church Choir, later becoming the precentor, a position he held for fifty-four years. In 1930 he won the gold medal at the Annual Mòd which, that year, was held in Dunoon. His first records were made for Beltona in late 1933 and he made further visits to the recording studio over the years. He formed a junior choir in Greenock around 1935 and by 1936 they were good enough to compete at the Mòd. He was very well-known throughout the Gaelic speaking world by virtue of his records, many broadcasts and personal appearance at ceilidhs and concerts. He holds the rather esoteric distinction of being, in late 1937, the first artist to have a Gaelic record broadcast over Australian radio, this was "Eilean an Fhraoich" on Beltona 2033. According to a letter written by Charles MacLean's grandfather Donald (1817-1907), describing events that had befallen his grandfather, also Donald (c1726-c1800), a French frigate anchored in Gott Bay, Tiree, in September 1746 and captured a local man, Neil MacFaden, whom they directed to pilot them to Lochnanuagh (now Loch nan Uamh) on Skye. MacFaden told them that he knew nothing of the coast and recommended that they use Donald MacLean of Ruaig. The latter agreed to take them to Lochnanuagh, on condition that he was dropped off at Tiree on the way back. Bonnie Prince Charlie and his followers duly embarked at Lochnanauagh. On the way back, however, it became clear that the French vessel did not intend to stop at Tiree but was heading directly to France. Donald MacLean, together with Neil MacFaden, who had been taken along in order to prevent him raising the alarm, managed to escape from the French vessel in a small boat that hung at the stern. Georgiana Maclean was the daughter of Sir Charles Fitzroy Maclean, 9th Baronet of Morvaren (1798–1883), 25th Chief of the Clan Maclean. On 20 October 1868 she married John Rolls, 1st Baron Llangattock. Their youngest son, The Hon. Charles Stewart Rolls (1877–1910), together with Frederick Henry Royce, co-founded Rolls-Royce Limited in 1906, having produced the first Rolls-Royce car two years earlier.

In 1900 the Duke and Duchess of York (the future King George V and Queen Mary) stayed at The Hendre, the Llangattock home near Monmouth in Wales (now a golf club), and Charles Rolls took them for what is thought to be their first drive in a car.

Charles Rolls was also a pioneer aviator and, initially, balloonist, making over 170 balloon ascents. He was a founding member of the Royal Aero Club in 1903 and was the second person in Britain to be licensed to fly by it. (Another member was [Sir Francis McClean](#).) In 1903 he won the Gordon Bennett Gold Medal for the longest single flight time. On 2 June 1910, he became the first man to make a non-stop double crossing of the English Channel by plane, which included the first East-bound aerial crossing of the English Channel. On 12 July 1910 he was killed in a flying accident, becoming the first Briton to be killed in an aeronautical accident involving a powered aircraft.

Lady Llangattock was an avid collector of memorabilia associated with Admiral Nelson. This collection now forms the basis of the exhibits at the Monmouth Museum (also known as the Nelson Museum and Local History Centre). Items relating to the Rolls family are also in this museum, as well as in the Rolls Hall, which was a gift to Monmouth from John Rolls and is now a public library.

Lady Llangattock also donated to the town the building known as the Nelson Rooms. It was originally designed as a working men's gymnasium. It then housed the Llangattock Collection of Nelson memorabilia, before this was moved to the Monmouth Museum. It is now an apartment building.

John McLean was a Boston merchant who, for reasons that are not known, bequeathed almost US\$ 120,000 to the Asylum for the Insane in Charlestown, Massachusetts, a division of Massachusetts General Hospital. In 1826 the asylum was re-named the McLean Asylum in his honour. It is now known as McLean Hospital and, while still an affiliate of Massachusetts General Hospital, is better known as the largest psychiatric affiliate of Harvard Medical School. It is now located at Belmont, Massachusetts, about 10 miles west of Boston.

Since its foundation in 1811 McLean Hospital has been a world leader in the treatment of mental illness and chemical dependency, research into the cause of mental illness and the training of generations of mental health care providers. In 1882 McLean opened the first psychiatric school of nursing. In 1888, McLean Hospital was the first psychiatric hospital in the United States to establish basic and clinical laboratories to study the role of biological factors in mental illness. It established the nation's first mental health information center to be run for and by consumers of mental health services. Today, McLean's scientific publications are among the most commonly cited sources for neuroscience, according to the Institute for Scientific Information. It is home to the Harvard Brain Tissue Resource Center, the world's largest "brain bank."

The famous children's nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb," was written about Mary Sawyer, an attendant who joined the McLean staff in 1832. As a child growing up in Sterling, Mass., Sawyer adopted a sickly lamb that had been abandoned by its mother. As it grew stronger, the lamb began to follow Mary everywhere, even to school. John Roulstone witnessed the lamb's devotion to Mary and was inspired to write a three-verse poem. Sarah Josepha Hale decided to incorporate the poem into a children's book and added the final three stanzas to the poem. She called the book "Mary Had a Little Lamb."

McLean was also indirectly responsible for one of the most important and long-lasting principles of investment management, the Prudent Man Rule.

After the South Sea Bubble burst in 1720, the English Court of Chancery developed a list of presumptively proper investments for trustees. These "legal lists," which were widely adopted in the United States, generally favoured investment in government bonds and first mortgages, and proscribed investments in equity.

In the seminal case of *Harvard College v. Armory* (26 Mass. 446, 469 [1830]), the Supreme Judicial Court of Massachusetts rejected the legal list approach and adopted what came to be known as the prudent man rule: The trustee must "observe how men of prudence, discretion and intelligence manage their own affairs, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income, as well as the probable safety of the capital to be invested." Nudged by the American

	Bankers Association, which sponsored a model statute codifying Armory, most states abandoned their legal lists for the prudent man rule. This rule stood until the second half of the twentieth century, when ... and the Modern Portfolio Theory was born.
John McLean USA	 John McLean, Head of Sales in Washington for the Standard Oil Company of California (now Chevron), is claimed to have been the first person to open a gas (petrol) station, which he did at the junction of Western Ave. and Holgate St in Seattle in 1907 (see photo). The plaque is located in Seattle's Waterfront Park. This claim is disputed by Shell, who claim that Shell subsidiary, Automobile Gasoline Co., offered drive-through refuelling services at 412 S. Theresa Ave in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1905.
John Wendell Maclean CV (-1992 Canada	Mr. MacLean lost his life following attempts to rescue family members from a burning house trailer in Inverness County, Nova Scotia, early on the morning of March 14, 1992. Alerted to the fire, he rushed outside with his wife and son, then re-entered as soon as he realized his daughter and three-year-old grandson were still inside. Although the ceiling was already crumbling, he passed through the heart of the blaze to rescue his grandson. Mr. MacLean twice attempted to return for his daughter, but the intensity of the fire forced him to retreat. A further attempt to enter through a window also failed. The daughter perished in the fire and Mr. MacLean succumbed to his burns a few days later. The Cross of Valour is the highest Canadian civilian award for bravery. Margaret Maclean Clephane (1791- 1830) UK	An accomplished poet, musician and artist in her own right, it was through her marriage that Torloisk on Mull came into the ownership of the Compton family, together with the chieftainship of the Macleans of Torloisk. Margaret Douglas Maclean Clephane was born in 1791, the daughter of Major-General Douglas Maclean Clephane of Carslogie, Fifeshire and Marianne MacLean, daughter of Lachlan MacLean of Torloisk. Her father died in 1802, when Margaret was only 9, and the famous novelist Sir Walter Scott became her guardian. In 1815 she married Spencer, Earl Compton of Compton (1790-1851), who became the Marquess of Northampton on the death of his father in 1828. With him she had four sons, Charles, William, Spencer and Alwyne, and two daughters, Marianne and Margaret. After

some years of ill-health, she died in Rome shortly after the birth of their sixth child [which one?], on 2nd April 1830.

[Spencer inherited all the Northampton property, principally Castle Ashby in Northamptonshire and Compton Wynyates in Warwickshire.]

She was a competent poet, a good musician and an accomplished artist. With her sister Anna-Jane she compiled several volumes of Gaelic harp music. The manuscripts are now owned by Captain A.C. Farquharson of Invercauld, with the exception of one, the 1816 manuscript, which is owned by Trinity College Dublin. There is also a volume of Gaelic song preserved at Castle Ashby in Northamptonshire (the Compton family seat). Her poetry, which was praised by Wordsworth for its simplicity, pathos, and energy, was never published but a selection was printed privately by her husband in 1833, after her death.

She was a proficient linguist, speaking French, German, Italian and Portuguese, as well as being fluent in Gaelic.

Henry Raeburn painted a famous portrait of her playing the harp, as well as a portrait of her husband, both now owned by the current Marquess of Northampton. (Raeburn also painted Sir Walter Scott and this picture hangs in the Scottish National Portrait Gallery in Edinburgh.)

Margaret's mother inherited the estate at Torloisk

Margaret is the great-great-great grandmother of Richard Maclean of Torloisk, the current Chieftain

	<i>Untitled XXV</i> by Willem de Kooning for US\$ 27,120,000, in the biggest contemporary art sale in history. Eykyn Maclean was established in New York in 2006. It opened its first gallery in New York in 2010 and a second in London in February 2012. Nicholas Maclean was previously the international director of the Impressionist and Modern Art department at Christie's. While there he was involved in what has been described as possibly the most expensive game of rock, paper, scissors ever played. When in 2005 Takashi Hashiyama, President of Maspro Denkoh Corporation in Japan, could not decide whether Christie's or Sotheby's should sell his US\$ 20 million art collection, he invited them to settle the matter in a game of rock, paper, scissors. While consulting friends on the psychology of the game, the President of Christie's in Japan found the expertise that she required in Nicholas Maclean's twin 11-year old daughters, Flora and Alice. They correctly advised Christie's to choose scissors, which beat the paper selected by Sotheby's. Ronald Maclean (1849-1910) South Africa	In 1890 Ronald Maclean of East London, Cape Colony, was awarded the Albert Medal of the First Class for life-saving services at sea. The Albert Medal was instituted by Queen Victoria in 1866. The Albert Medal, First Class was renamed the Albert Medal in gold in 1917 and was discontinued in 1949, when it was replaced by the George Cross, Britain's highest award for civilian gallantry and the equal highest award, with the Victoria Cross, in Britain's honours system. The Albert Medal, second class (renamed simply Albert Medal in 1917), was discontinued in 1971. Only 25 Albert Medals in gold were awarded for life-saving at sea during its 83-year existence. William McLean New Zealand	In March 1898 William McLean, a Wellington businessman and former Member of Parliament, imported the first cars into New Zealand. These were two Benz cars, which he called 'Lightening' and 'Petrolette'. There were however no legal provisions which allowed cars to be freely used on the open road. Under existing law they had to be treated as traction engines - travelling at walking-pace and with men ahead and behind. McLean therefore introduced a private member's bill to legalise the use of cars and this, when passed on 28 October 1898, became the McLean Motor Car Act. Under the Act the use of cars was allowed providing they were lit after dark and did not go faster than 12 miles (20 kilometres) per hour. A copy of the Act can be seen here.

MacLean USA	Acoustician with the the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn who in 1958 answered a perennial question: How many guests can attend a cocktail party before it becomes too noisy for conversation? He declared that the answer, for a given room, is $N_0 = K \left(1 + \frac{(aV/4\pi h) + d_0^2}{d_0^2 S_m^2} \right)$ where N_0 = the critical number of guests above which each speaker will try overcome the background noise by raising his voice

K = the average number of guests in each conversational group
 a = the average sound absorption coefficient of the room
 V = the room's volume
 h = a properly weighted mean free path of a ray of sound
 d_0 = the conventional minimum distance between speakers
 S_m = the minimum signal-to-noise ratio for the listeners

When the critical guest N_0 arrives, each speaker is forced to increase his acoustic power in small increments ("I really don't know what she sees in him." — "Beg your pardon?" — "I say, I REALLY DON'T KNOW WHY SHE GOES OUT WITH HIM") until each group is forced to huddle uncomfortably close in order to continue the conversation.

"We see therefore that, once the critical number of guests is exceeded, the party suddenly becomes a loud one," MacLean concluded, somewhat sadly. "The power of each talker rises exponentially to a practical maximum, after which each reduces his or her talking distance below the conventional distance and then maintains, servo fashion, just the proximity, tête à tête, required to attain a workable signal-to-noise ratio. Thanks to this phenomenon the party, although a loud one, can still be confined within one apartment."

Wilmer McLean
(1814-1882)

USA



Wilmer McLean was a sugar trader but his claim to fame lies in the fact that the American Civil War started and ended on his property.

The initial engagements on July 18, 1861, in what would become the First Battle of Bull Run, fought on July 21, took place on McLean's farm, the Yorkshire Plantation, in Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia. Union Army artillery fired at McLean's house, headquarters for Confederate Brigadier General P.G.T. Beauregard, and a cannonball dropped through the kitchen fireplace.

In 1863 McLean moved 120 miles south to Appomattox County, Virginia, to a community called Appomattox Court House, partly to protect his family from the conflict and partly to facilitate his business, supplying sugar to the Confederates, which was made difficult by the Union army presence in his area of northern Virginia.

On April 9, 1865, the war came back to Wilmer McLean when Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrendered to Lieutenant General Ulysses S. Grant in the parlour of McLean's new house in Appomattox Court House, effectively ending the Civil War.

McLean's house was promptly looted by the Union soldiers for souvenirs. The table on which Grant had signed the surrender document was presented to the wife of General Custer, who bequeathed it to the National Museum of American History, part of the Smithsonian in Washington, DC, where it remains on display, together with the two chairs used by Lee and Grant. The house is now part of the Appomattox Court House National Historical Monument.

Wilmer McLean was born on 3rd May 1814 in Manassas, Virginia. He died on 5th June 1882 in Alexandria, Virginia, and is buried

there in St. Paul's Episcopal Cemetery.
